Three measureable points of pride:

- Our PBIS Set review was a 97% for module 1. This is a massive improvement from the 54% we had previously scored.
- Our TWC survey indicated in numerous areas our staff is comfortable and enjoys their working conditions at VLE. Almost all areas improved from the 2014 TWC to the 2016 TWC survey.
- Our cohort data indicates that our 3rd to 4th and 4th to 5th cohorts are showing gains each year as indicated by the proficiency on both reading and math EOGs.

Goals to improve our school in the coming year:

- Literacy 20% gains moving us from 63.4% on College and Career Standards by 2018
- Math 20% gains moving us from 68.6% on College and Career Standards by 2018
- Culture/Climate 85% or above on the Module 3 SET review

Key strategies to continuously improve and accomplish goals:

- Revised our approach to students in need of interventions. We are implementing a more needs based approach with data driven decision making.
- Extensive parent involvement opportunities including: Family Night, Math Night, Science Night, One Book One School event and Quarterly PTA meetings with student performances.
- Strengthening core instruction in both reading and math via our school's frameworks and visiting other high performing schools to study their methods for success.

SUMMARY OF SCHOOL DATA ANALYSIS AND/OR COMPREHENSIVE NEEDS ASSESSMENT

1. What does an analysis of your school data and/or a comprehensive needs assessment tell you about the school's strengths?
Vass-Lakeview has maintained growth and proficiency in the last 3 years of documented school data. Despite our -60% free and reduced lunch status, our students are making gains and moving towards College and Career Readiness proficiency standards. Significant gains have occurred with our Hispanic population and in 5th grade science. Additionally, over the past 3 years all of our cohorts have shown growth in proficiency over time. With each year they are at Vass-Lakeview, our students become more proficient and ready for life after high school.
2. What does the data analysis and/or comprehensive needs assessment tell you about the school's gaps or opportunities for improvement?
There are significant areas for growth across the board. The data indicates a huge discrepancy for our students who are identified with disabilities. According to EOGs our school has significant achievement gaps between subgroups of white, black, LEP and SWD. The gap for our EC students increased this year. Additionally, our mClass data indicates that 59.9% of our K-2 students are deemed proficient on the TRC measurement. Additionally, our transiet population has an effect on student learning. We are at a 20% mobility rate, meaning 1 out of every 5 students is new to VLE over the course of each year.

3. What data is missing, and how will you go about collecting this information for future use?
We are missing math data for K-2 students. As a school we are working towards better analysis of the quarterly assessment data. Additionally it is difficult to target interventions for ED students since we do not have access to this information. We are hopeful to implement a school-wide universal screener which will help us identify math students who may be missing basic foundational skills in mathematics.
